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Introduction

Founded in 2007, the Department of East Asian Studies offers both undergraduate and graduate programs in the areas of “sinology and culture” and “politics and economics.” Following the Graduate Institute of Political Science merged with this department in 2015, and this department has started to offer the doctoral program in 2017/08/01. Beginning in 2018/08/01, in order to further cultivate cross-disciplinary professional talents, especially those majoring in Northeast Asia, China, Southeast Asia and surrounding countries, the Department of East Asian Studies made changes to the original grouping recruitment system, focusing instead on the integration of multiple disciplines, with “culture and its application” and “political economy and regional development” as its centerpiece subjects.

Our undergraduate program aims to cultivate all-round talent in the field of the humanities and awards graduates with a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) degree. Master's degree programs aim to cultivate professional talent with independent research and

practical capabilities and award graduates with a Master of Social Science (M.S.S.) degree. Ph.D. programs aim to cultivate professional talent in the humanities and social studies and award graduates with a Doctor of Social Sciences (Ph.D.). To date, there are 18 full-time faculty in this department, including 9 professors, 7 associate professors, and 2 assistant professors with expertise in the fields of sinology, history, literature, cultural studies, international relations, political science, cross-strait research, and finance and economics in East Asia.



Instructional Objectives

Educational objective: to cultivate cross-disciplinary talents for regional application and research course.

[Undergraduate Program]

To cultivate all-round talents in the humanistic field by offering courses that cover “culture and its application” and “political economy and regional development” as well as providing Japanese, Korean and Vietnamese language lessons in order to achieve cross-regional and cross-disciplinary goals.

[Master's Program]

To cultivate professional research talents with independent thinking and research capacity.

[Ph.D. Program]

To cultivate senior academic researchers with core courses that strengthen the cross-disciplinary quality and provide solid training on regional research.
